Bobby

My name is Bobby Wee, and I am 36 years old. My highest education attained was Diploma in Electrical Engineering at Ngee Ann Polytechnic.

Since I was in my teens, I suffered from a degenerative disease that left me wheelchair bound in my late 20s.

I am dependent on my mum . whom is now in her 70s, as my caregiver and am currently staying with my mum together with my older sister.

Some of my symptoms are coordination of my hands, tremor hands, slur speech, sensitive reflexes and more.

Unfortunately, there is no cure for this disease as yet. I am currently under long-term medications and have to make routine doctor/specialist visits in Tan Tock Seng Hospital.



Knowing ServeHope

I did not know anything about ServeHope until Ms Grace Wong . also known as Auntie Grace (founder of ServeHope) called me for in for an interview in early 2009.

This is where I got to know about ServeHope, and that more than 50% of their employees are People with Disabilities. The company assigns different roles to the employees with disabilities depending on their knowledge, skills and abilities.

When I first started, I requested for data entry work because I had little knowledge of how to create websites and had no idea what html was.

Everything was foreign to me at first, but I was guided by one of my mentor, Auntie Grace.

Due to my disabilities, it was a challenge looking for a job. It took me more than 5 years getting a job. I have tried finding jobs at sheltered agencies, organizations for the handicap and online job search portals.

I faced many challenges during my job hunt. It was important to take note of the location of the workplace and transport was a great concern to me.

For me, the only means of getting around via public transport is only by a cab, and it is not easy to get transport without relying on my caregiver. Hailing a cab is not easy for abled person, not to mention PWDs (People With Disabilities).

Even though it was frustrating at times, I did not give up and tried my best.
